

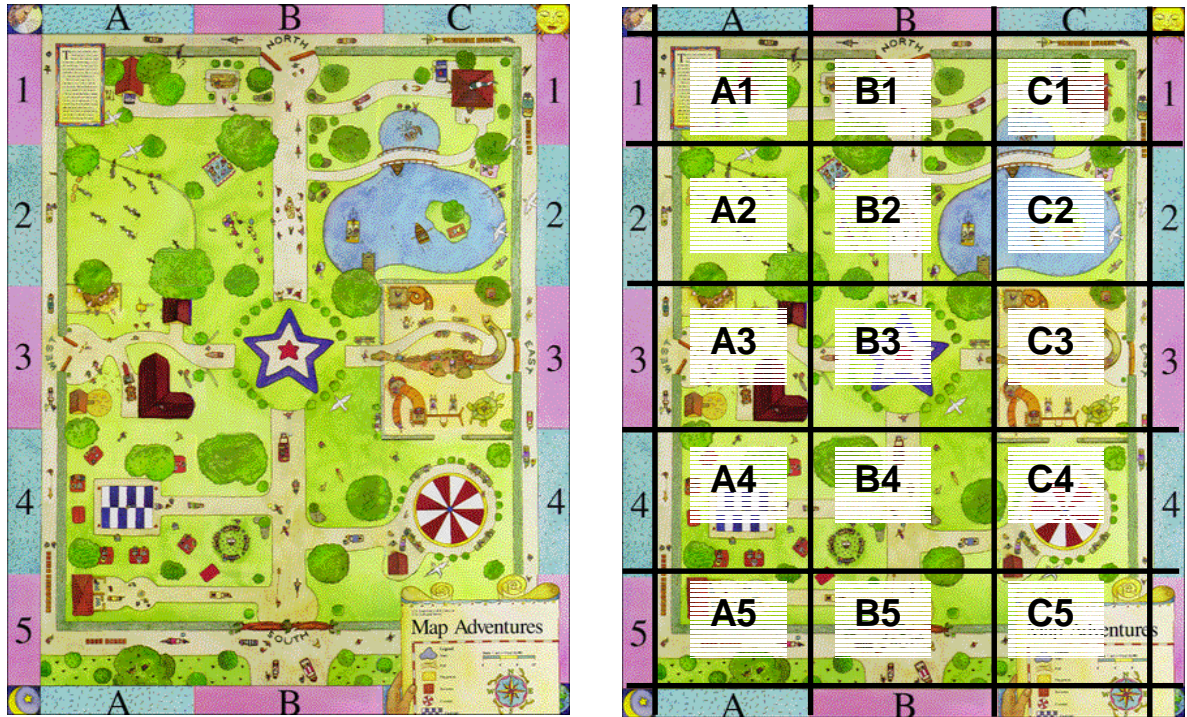

Lesson 6: Map Grids

Here is a picture of a map of the park.

Look at the letters on the north and south sides of the map. Look at the numbers on the east and west sides of the map.



If you draw straight lines between the letter boxes on the north and south and straight lines between the number boxes on the east and west it forms a set of equal boxes.

Boxes which divide a map into equal parts are called a **Map Grid**.

Each box in the grid can be given a name or code. The name of each box in the grid on this map is made up of the letter on the north and south of sides of the box and the number on the east and west sides of the box.
